

ROY ALLTOP (WIRT COUNTY)



The late Roy Alltop stepped back into coaching just last season at Wirt County High School, guiding the Tiger varsity basketball program. It was a team he labeled as "a great group of boys."

Coaching was a labor of love for Alltop, who spent the majority of his life leading young adults at the

Elizabeth-based school. Of his 24 years in coaching, 21 of those took place at Wirt County.

His affection for sports started in Gilmer County. He was a 1974 graduate of Gilmer County High School, starring

in baseball and earning All-State and All-Little Kanawha Conference honors. He remained in Gilmer County and took his talents on the diamond to Glenville State College, where he played for the Pioneers.

After college, he stepped into the coaching world. He became the all-time winningest coach for Wirt County High School basketball with 245 victories.

During his time at Wirt, Alltop guided three teams to the State Tournament in Class A. The Tigers reached the semifinals twice and played for the state championship in 1990.

Two of his Tiger teams captured championships in the Little Kanawha Conference and three others finished as the league runner-up. He had 11 winning seasons and coached in the North-South All-Star Classic on four occasions.

During his outstanding career, Alltop was the recipient of the prestigious Little Kanawha Conference's Wayne Underwood Award, which goes to the top coach in all sports. He was also named the West Virginia Boys Basketball Coach of the Year for all classes by the state coaches association.

JEFF BURKHAMER (WOOD COUNTY)

Jeff Burkhamer had quite the athletic career at both Williamstown High School and Alderson Broaddus College.

As a Williamstown Yellowjacket, Burkhamer starred on the basketball court as well as the football and baseball fields. On the court, he was a two-time Class AA First Team All-Stater in 1979 and 1980. He also earned First Team All-Little Kanawha Conference honors those two seasons and gained Honorable Mention in 1978.



He helped Williamstown to a 40-6 record during his last two seasons as a basketball player. He was selected to the West Virginia High School All-Star game in 1980. In 2004, he was named the fourth-best player overall on the Parkersburg Area Silver Anniversary Team.

In baseball, he was a three-year starter at second base was a Second Team All-State pick and First Team selection in 1978. In football, he was a starter

at quarterback/safety three straight years, earning Special Honorable Mention All-State.

In college, he started three years at point guard for the Battlers. He was the program's all-time assist leader (646). He started four years in baseball. He was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame Class of 2001.

Following college, he launched what would become a sensational basketball coaching career. Burkhamer served as the head coach at North Greenville College, Santa Fe Community College, Armstrong Atlantic State University, Lander University and the University of West Florida. He accumulated 493 victories and led his programs to many history-making accomplishments. He was also an assistant at Winthrop, Charleston Southern, Morehead State and Marshall. In addition, he worked for Grand Rapids in the Continental Basketball Association.



RICK HAUGHT (RITCHIE COUNTY)

Quite simply, Rick Haught has been a man for all seasons when it comes to the coaching profession. He's excelled as a leader in football, basketball and track and field.

Haught is a 1981 graduate of Williamstown High School, where his love for sports grew to another level. A graduate of Glenville State College, Haught would ultimately make his way to Ritchie County where he evolved into a championship coach.

In track and field, Haught guided the 2003 Rebels to the first state title for any sport in school history. His 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2015 Rebel teams also brought home state championship trophies. In addition, five other teams finished as the runner-up. In 2015, he was

named the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association Boys Coach of the Year. He's also won several other Coach of the Year honors for track and field.

As a head football coach, Haught led the Rebels to the 2022 Class A state championship. He compiled a 45-15 overall record as Ritchie's head coach and had three other playoff teams. In 2022, he was named the Little Kanawha Conference's Wayne Underwood Coach of the Year Award winner for all sports.

In basketball, Haught guided the Rebels in the seasons of 2008-2014 and again from 2018-2023. His 2021 squad became the first in school history to reach the State Tournament.

LEANNE ROSS KELLY (WASHINGTON COUNTY)

A two-sport star at Marietta High School, Le-Anne Ross Kelly has the distinction of stepping into the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame with her father, Bill Ross Jr., who was inducted in 2006.

Kelly was a superb two-sport athlete at Marietta High School, starring on the basketball court and in track and field.

On the court, she was an All-Ohio Third Team pick in 2010. In addition, she was twice named the Southeastern Ohio Athletic League's Player of the Year while being a three-time All-SEOAL selection. Kelly was named to the All-District 10 Team three times and was the District Player of the Year. She also played in the Ohio North-South game. At the end of her career, she owned three MHS school records, including the single-game scoring mark of 39


points. She is third all-time in scoring at MHS with 1,289 points.

In track and field, she owns the school record in the high jump. She qualified for the State Meet three times during her career.

After high school, she headed to the University of Charleston (WV) where she was a three-year starter for the Lady Golden Eagles in basketball. She scored 1,135 points during her career. She is fourth all-time in 3-point field goals for a season and career. While at UC, Kelly earned All-Mountain East Conference honors in 2014 and was a member of the Mountain East Conference All-Tournament Team that same year.



DOUG LITTLE (WOOD COUNTY)



Wood County native Doug Little has done some big-time things while coaching baseball at Potomac State in Keyser (WV), turning the school's program into a junior college powerhouse. The 2025 campaign was his 28th season leading the Catamounts.

While at the school, Little has amassed nearly 900 wins as the head coach. He's enjoyed 21 seasons of 30 or more victories. Along the way, he has been named the American Baseball Coaches Association Regional Coach of the Year 10 times.

His career at Potomac State includes four trips to the Division One Junior College World Series. Under his guidance, the Catamounts have won the NJCAA Region 20 Baseball Tournament

championship 14 times. In 2016, he was inducted into the NJCAA Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame.

Several of his players advanced on to play for four-year programs and numerous Catamounts have been drafted by Major League Baseball clubs. Besides his outstanding coaching, he was instrumental in leading the way for Potomac State's Golden Park baseball facility, which opened in 2002.

Prior to coaching the Catamounts. He was an assistant for five seasons at West Virginia University.

A 1984 Parkersburg High School graduate, Little played baseball at Alderson Broaddus College where he was a two-time All-West Virginia Conference outfielder.

MICK PRICE (JACKSON COUNTY)

If there is an individual who was born to coach it would be Mick Price, a proud graduate of old Mannington High School in Marion County, which is now a part of North Marion. Price, a 1970 graduate of MHS, starred in football, basketball and baseball for the Gators.

He took his talents to Fairmont State College and learned basketball from the late, great Joe Retton (who had a winning percentage of .836 - the highest level of any men's basketball coach at all collegiate levels). While at Fairmont, Price played baseball for the Fighting Falcons. He would begin his coaching career at the grade school level while still in college.

His first head coaching job came at old Sistersville High School (now a part of Tyler Consolidated). He was the head coach of the state's leading scorer, Richard Summers, in the season of 1977-78. Price was also the head baseball coach and an assistant football coach for the Tigers.

He left Sistersville for Ravenswood High School in the summer of 1978. This past season was his 47th leading the boys program at the Jackson County school. He presently has 776 career victories, making him the second-winningest active coach in the Mountain State.

Along the way, Price has guided the Runnin' Red Devil program to a pair of Class AA state championships in 2006 and 2009. Three other teams have finished as the state runner-up. Overall, Price has led 16 teams to the State Tournament, including his second Ravenswood squad of

1980, which became the first to do so in 30 years.

He's been honored numerous times during his career, including being named the prestigious Jerome Van Meter Award winner in 2009. Voted on by the West Virginia Sports Writers Association, the award goes to the top high school coach for all sports in West Virginia. In addition, he has been the recipient of the Little Kanawha Conference's Wayne Underwood Award, which goes to the top coach in all sports. The historic Old Gymnasium is home to the Mick Price Court (named in his honor during the 2006 season).

At Ravenswood, Price has also served as the head football coach, head boys track and field coach and athletic director. As the football leader in the seasons of 2012-14, Price twice guided the Red Devils to the Class AA state playoffs and was recognized on two occasions as the Little Kanawha Conference Football Coach of the Year.



DAN SCHWIETERMAN (NOBLE CO.)

A native of Indiana, Dan Schwieterman has enjoyed a great life in the state of Ohio coaching the sport of basketball. A 1969 graduate of Bryan High School in Indiana, Schwieterman made his way to the Buckeye State, where he earned a bachelor's degree from Ohio University and a master's from the University of Dayton.

When he wrapped up his phenomenal coaching career as a boys basketball coach, Schwieterman had guided his teams to 459 wins. The bulk of those victories were produced at Shenandoah High School. His time with the school covered an impressive 34 years. Prior to his time at Shenandoah, he spent one season as a head coach for old Madison High School (now a part of Buckeye Trail in Ohio).


Schwieterman directed five Zep teams to the Pioneer Valley Conference championship during his Shenandoah days. His 1991 and 1997 teams won Ohio Valley Athlet-

ic Conference titles.

He was named the Pioneer Valley Conference Coach of the year five times. In addition, he was a four-time Eastern District and two-time OVAC Coach of the Year honoree.

Other honors included being inducted into the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2020. He earned the prestigious Ohio High School Boys Coaches Association Bob Arnzen Award, which goes to a coach who has devoted 20 consecutive years or more to the same school and for their loyalty and commitment to Ohio high school basketball (the late Arnzen is Ohio's ninth all-time winningest boys basketball coach). In addition, Schwieterman was honored with the Ohio High School Athletic Association Sportsmanship, Ethics and Integrity Award in 2010.

He was the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Director and State Representative for several years during his coaching career.



SYDNEY SNODGRASS (RITCHIE COUNTY)

A 2014 graduate of Ritchie County High School, Sydney Snodgrass made a name for herself on the golf links.

She was a member of three straight All-Tournament teams during the state golf championships put on by the West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission, making her the first female in state history to accomplish that feat. This came at a time when there wasn't a girls-only State Tournament.

She scored the lowest nine-hole score in state history with a 28.

Following high school, Snodgrass headed for the University of Alabama-Birmingham (UAB) on a golf scholarship. With the Blazers, Sno-

dgrass earned the Conference USA women's golfer of the week twice.

She recorded her first collegiate title at the USA Spring Invitational. She was named to the Conference USA All- Academic Team both as a junior and senior, becoming the first two-time member in program history. She also earned the C-USA Academic Medal. As a junior, she was a Third Team All-Conference pick and earned All-Tournament honors at the C-USA championship event.

Her accomplishments have proven to be an inspiration for many young female golfers over the past several years.

BUTCH VARNEY (JACKSON COUNTY)

As a coach, Butch Varney produced some amazing things on two different courts - basketball and tennis - at Ravenswood High School, his beloved alma mater.

Devilette basketball was recognized as one of the top programs in the state with Varney, a 1970 graduate of Ravenswood, at the helm.

In his 22 years of guiding the red and black, Varney's teams registered 330 victories. No win stands out more than in December of 1982 when his Devilettes brought home the Class AA state championship trophy, defeating old Dunbar High School, 65-32, at the Charleston Civic Center Coliseum. (WV girls basketball was played in the fall for many years before switching to the winter months).

The title culminated several years of hard work by Varney to reach the pinnacle of success.

During Varney's time leading the way, Ravenswood made it to the State Tournament seven times. Four of his Devilette squads made it to the semifinals of Class AA. Ravenswood captured 14 sectional titles during his tenure.

Three of Varney's teams won championships in the competitive Little Kanawha Conference. He was honored by the league several times as the Coach of the Year. Individually, Varney coached eight First Team All-Staters. In 1988, he was named as the National High School Athletic Association Representative for West Virginia Girls Basketball.

On December 22, 2022 - 40 years after winning that

illustrious state title - the court inside the home for Ravenswood girls basketball (now known as the Devilette Athletic Center) was named in his honor.

Varney also spent four years as an assistant girls coach at Ripley and was instrumental in the Lady Vikings reaching the Final Four in Class AAA one season. They lost to eventual champion South Charleston, which featured two future WNBA players.

Besides basketball, Varney coached tennis at Ravenswood High School with his teams winning 448 matches. Several players won championships or finished as a runner-up. His 2013 girls team finished as the Class AA/A runner-up.

Varney is thrilled to join his daughter, Mary Beth Hunt, a 2006 inductee, as a Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame inductee.



TED VANSOY (RITCHIE COUNTY)

Ted VanScoy's life in athletics includes both coaching and officiating. A 1970 graduate of Doddridge County High School, Vanscoy has been a part of several successful athletic teams in Ritchie County, including golf.

From 2005-14 he led the Rebels of Ritchie County High School to three state championships and a pair of runner-up finishes. He also had five Little Kanawha Conference championships during that span. He was the 2013-14 West Virginia Coaches Association Golf Coach of the Year.

He had a 78.0 winning percentage on the links against primarily Class AAA schools.

He got his start in coaching at old

Pennsboro High School (which combined with Harrisville to form Ritchie County High) under the late Kenny Wright, a Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Famer, as a football assistant. He would also coach football at Ritchie County from 1986-89 and again in the seasons of 2018-2021.

VanScoy coached track and field at both Pennsboro (1979-1986) and Ritchie County (1986-1990). His 1988 girls team was fourth in the state. He returned to lead the Lady Rebel program from 2003-2014. His teams won three Little Kanawha Conference titles and finished as state runner-up on five occasions.

During basketball season, VanScoy was recognized as one of the state's top officials for several years.

ED WILSON (PLEASANTS) COUNTY



A 1970 graduate of St. Marys High School, Ed Wilson had many wonderful years coaching at his alma mater.

His love for sports led him to Marshall University on a football scholarship. He was a defensive back on the scout team for the Thundering Herd. Freshmen were not eligible and thus didn't travel. Wilson was one of many who lost his football brothers and coaches in the 1970 plane crash.

He suffered a knee injury in 1971 and didn't get to play for Jack Lengyel's Young Thundering Herd. He would later transfer to Glenville State College, playing both football and baseball for the Pioneers.

Wilson got his coaching career going as an assistant in football at Oak Glen High School in 1976 before moving to

Eastern Local in Ohio. He returned to Pleasants County in 1977, coaching football and basketball at the middle school level.

His chance to lead St. Marys in baseball started in 1990 and he would guide the Blue Devils on the diamond through the 2022 campaign. During that stretch, his purple and gold captured 505 victories.


He led two teams to the West Virginia State Tournament in 1990 and 2014. He also coached 11 teams to sectional titles and six others to Little Kanawha Conference crowns.

Wilson was a six-time LKC Coach of the Year and Regional Coach of the Year twice. He coached in four North-South All-Star baseball team. Wilson had 20 First or Second Team All-Staters during his career.





History: The seed for the creation of the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame was planted by local sporting goods entrepreneur Bob Zide several years ago during a business trip to Syracuse, New York.

The Syracuse Sports Hall of Fame is housed at the airport in Syracuse, and it caught Zide's eye as he headed to his destination.

Not long after that, Zide was in Dayton, Ohio, for a sporting goods show. At the convention center where the event was held was the display for the Dayton Sports Hall of Fame.

"I thought it would be kind of neat if we had something like that in the Mid-Ohio Valley," Zide said.

Zide contacted Parkersburg sportswriters Nick Scala and Dave Poe, along with local sports radio personality Steve Daugherty, to talk about the idea of establishing a sports shrine for the Mid-Ohio Valley. Then, while all four were at the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission offices for a state football playoff meeting in November of 1996, initial plans for the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame were set in motion.

Zide, Scala, Poe and Daugherty then met to lay down the initial guidelines for the project. The first step was to put together a list of men and women who would serve on the Hall of Fame committee. Once that was accomplished, the expanded group – including individuals representing all seven counties in the hall's coverage area – put together the bylaws and induction criteria for the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame.

Purpose: The Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame was established May 1, 1997, to honor outstanding individual athletes for their achievements and accomplishments.
